CITY UPDATES





OLD TOWN NEWHALL PARKING STRUCTURE

The Old Town Newhall Parking Structure is being built at the corner of 9th Street and Railroad Avenue in Old Town Newhall. Once the City-managed structure is completed, it will consist of 372 public parking spaces! The Old Town Newhall Parking Structure is one of three monumental projects planned for the City's "Redevelopment Block," located at the corner of Railroad Avenue and Lyons Avenue. Construction on the parking structure is expected to be completed by spring 2018.

WAYFINDING SIGNS

Wayfinding signs have been installed throughout the City's pedestrian, bikeway and trail network. There are a total of 168 new signs, some replacing old trail signs. The signs will make it easier for residents and visitors to navigate routes to key city destinations, such as a Metrolink station or nearby library. The signs include directional details and distance, allowing residents to explore new places with confidence!



YIELD TO PEDESTRIANS **BLANK OUT SIGNS**

Yield to Pedestrians blank out signs have been installed at the intersection of McBean Parkway and Orchard Village Road, Magic Mountain Parkway and Railroad Avenue and McBean Parkway and Town Center Drive. Only activated when a pedestrian hits a button, these signs have proven in studies to increase the yield rate of motorists, making it safer for residents to cross the street.

NEWHALL RANCH ROAD BRIDGE WIDENING

Construction has started on the Newhall Ranch Road Bridge Widening project! Demolition work on the south side of the bridge began in June. Foundation work for the pier walls is nearly complete and the pier walls are being installed. Crews restriped the bridge in early June to allow traffic to remain open as usual during the construction period (three lanes in each direction). Once completed, this bridge will have two more traffic lanes, for a total of four lanes in each direction, a raised median, protected pedestrian walkway, bike path and new trail connections! The project is scheduled for completion by October 2018.

AFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL

The City has been awarded a \$160,000 Active Transportation Program grant through the California Department of Transportation for development of a Safe Routes to School plan for all the junior high and high schools within the City. This plan will identify improvements and programs for each school site and adjacent neighborhoods that would promote non-motorized forms of transportation and provide increased walking and biking accessibility and safety. The plan will also provide schools with education and encouragement materials to teach and promote pedestrian and bicycle safety.



The City of Santa Clarita maintains 34 beautiful parks to ensure residents experience a fun and SAFE time with their family. Examples of upgrades that were completed this year include resurfaced sport courts - one basketball court in Santa Clarita Park, one basketball court in Valencia Glen Park and one basketball court in Begonias Lane Park. In addition, old rubber play area surfaces were removed and replaced at Almendra Park. Santa Clarita Park and Circle J Ranch Park. Creekview Park has also received new shade structures over the play area.





AWARD-WINNING PROGRAMS

This year the City of Santa Clarita won two prestigious League of California Cities Helen Putnam Awards for Excellence.

EMPLOYEE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

City employees are offered multiple opportunities to cultivate their skills and improve their customer service. Employee programs include a 1:1 Mentoring Program, 18-month Leadership Academy and other training and job shadowing opportunities. Thanks to the effectiveness of the City's employee development programs, the Santa Clarita community will continue to receive the same high level of customer service from well-trained, highly skilled staff at all levels of the City's organization.

HEROIN KILLS PROGRAM

Heroin Kills is a multi-faceted campaign that raises awareness of heroin use in Santa Clarita in an effort to stop the drug from destroying local families. Focus groups, outreach events and the annual Heroin Kills symposium have led to teenagers and parents increasing their knowledge of the dangers of drug use and have resulted in a reduction in the amount of heroin-related deaths in Santa Clarita.

MESSAGE FROM CAPTAIN *ROBERT LEWIS*

As your new Chief of Police, with 32 years on the force, and a long-time resident of the Santa Clarita Valley, I am committed to serving others and keeping our community safe. You may have noticed, since I took command in April, things have been a little different. Following the mandate set forth by the City, and working closely with Santa Clarita Valley Sheriff's Station personnel, we are taking a firm, proactive stance on crime.

There are many issues we are facing head on, but the three that have risen to the top are heroin/opiate use, overall crime reduction and traffic safety.

This spring saw a string of dangerous overdoses in our City, leading to several hospitalizations and one death. Using department resources and teaming up with our valuable local and regional partners. we made a push to get the drugs off our City streets and put the drug dealers in jail. Our deputies are also now trained to administer Narcan®, a lifesaving drug that immediately reverses effects of an opioid overdose. By working with the county, Henry Mayo Newhall Hospital, local treatment facilities and other community resources, we are leading the fight against heroin in Santa Clarita.

Our Crime Prevention Unit is back on the streets. utilizing strategies to reduce crime in our City. One of those tactics is mission specific patrols in areas of recent criminal activity, which have proven effective, and we've even caught criminals in the act.

We now have even more resources devoted to stopping reckless drivers. There are six motor deputies on our streets citing drivers who make the choice to speed, drive distracted or not follow the rules of the road.

The loss of even one life to drugs or traffic collisions is one too many in the eyes of your protectors. I would like to thank the community for its support. Our sheriff's deputies are out there every day working hard to keep you safe. I am proud of what we have accomplished in the last seven months and I look forward to working together to cut crime even further in Santa Clarita.

## MESSAGE FROM INTERIM ASSISTANT FIRE CHIEF

- Sign up for CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training.

Practice and Build Out Your Plans

- Hold a family evacuation drill.
- Complete an Emergency Financial First Aid Kit.
- Maintain emergency savings.
- Know how to access community resources.

- Organize your neighborhood so that you are all prepared to take care of one another.
