

we finally close the book on 2020 and move into a new year, there is much to look forward to in Santa Clarita in 2021. Hopefully, the restrictions to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic will begin easing up as the vaccine becomes more widely available. With this positive development on the horizon, we will once again be able to gather as a community. Our residents have much to look forward to in the form of new City amenities in the new year.

The highlights will undoubtedly be the new Canyon Country Community Center and the new Santa Clarita Valley Sheriff's Station (read the specifics on page 4). These landmark City projects will bring activity, enrichment, learning opportunities, entertainment and much more – as well as a more efficient and effective home for the hardworking staff at our Sheriff's Station.

The City purchased the former Valencia Ice Station last year, and staff has been hard at work refurbishing the decades-old building to once again open it to the public for ice skating, hockey, curling and as an event space. A new name and a new look are in the works, and the City is excited to welcome the community into this revamped facility.

Plans are already in the works for a new inclusive playground on the west side of the City. Santa Clarita's first inclusive playground opened to the community a year ago at Canyon Country Park. It has become a popular play place for children of all ages and abilities, even though it was forced to be shut down for several months. The American Public Works Association even recognized the play area as a 2020 "Project of the Year." One of the reasons this project was so effective was the community collaboration that went into the planning process. The City will be reaching out to residents once again to find out what elements are important to include in the next inclusive play area.

Even though the projects have been completed, residents should finally get to enjoy the new shopping, dining and entertainment options in Old Town Newhall. Once movie theatres are able to operate again, Laemmle Theatres will welcome the community to the operate again, at the corner of Railroad and Lyons to enjoy art-house

operate again, Laeinine Theaties with recommendation of the corner of Railroad and Lyons to enjoy art-house films and festival favorites in the two-story, seven-screen location offering 500 seats. Right next door, Newhall Crossings is already home to dozens of residents who are enjoying the spectacular views from their upper floor apartments, while retail and dining establishments are ready to welcome the public on the first floor. Meanwhile, boutiques, tasting rooms and other restaurants up and down Main Street are anticipating the time when they can invite the public back at a normal capacity.

After the challenges we all endured last year, we all deserve to have some exciting opportunities on the horizon. Stay tuned to the City's website and social media pages for the latest on the COVID-19 restrictions and grand openings of these landmark projects.





ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The past year was filled with hardship and uncertainties for many of Santa Clarita's small businesses, but there were also positive moments that deserve recognition. In 2020, the City of Santa Clarita introduced the **Safer Business Commitment** to build confidence in shopping locally. The City was also able to award COVID-19 Relief Grants to 149 local businesses with the help of the Santa Clarita Valley Economic Development Corporation. Other noteworthy moments include the City's partnership with Trek Bicycles on the Trek Bike Park of Santa Clarita, along with the City's partnership with, and support from, Logix Federal Credit Union to provide muchneeded support and items to some of our community's essential workers.

I know most of us are hoping for a fresh start with the new year and to leave 2020 far behind.

The vaccine for COVID-19 is already being

distributed, and in the next few months, I am optimistic that we will begin to move back toward normalcy.

Message from the Sheriff's Captain JUSTIN DIEZ

The safety of Santa Clarita Valley streets remains a priority for the deputies and staff at the Santa Clarita Valley Sheriff's Station.
Although traffic volume declined in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and residents staying at home, the Sheriff's station continues to work closely

with the City of Santa Clarita to analyze collision and citation data to optimize traffic enforcement operations.

As expected, with fewer vehicles on the road, the overall collision rate in Santa Clarita has dropped significantly this year. However, deputies continue to cite drivers for unsafe actions, including speeding, failing to yield to pedestrians in crosswalks and using cell phones. In fact, citation numbers are only slightly down from 2019 and are higher than they were in 2018.

It is important to remember that even though there has been less traffic, it does not mean that drivers have free reign to ignore the law. On the contrary, fewer people driving has meant more pedestrians and cyclists on sidewalks and crosswalks. When you get behind the wheel of your car, please be on high alert and expect pedestrians – especially families near City parks and facilities – before making turns and entering or exiting parking lots. A few added moments to check blind spots and mirrors can eliminate injuries and save lives.

In 2021, our focus remains to continue the downward trend in the collision rate that the City has seen in recent years. Please be on the lookout for new information, tips and more from the City's award-winning Heads Up Traffic Safety campaign, as we continue to strive to reduce the number of accidents seen involving pedestrians and cyclists, as well as those involving someone driving under the influence. New Sheriff's Station Nearing Completion

Progress continues on the 7.6-acre site for the new Santa Clarita Valley Sheriff's Station, located on Golden Valley Road. Construction has been completed on the roofing for the 46,500 square-foot Sheriff's Station, as well as the vehicle maintenance building. Also, already complete are the communication tower and perimeter site walls. Ongoing construction will include building the interior, helipad, fueling areas and more. The new Sheriff's Station is expected to be completed and turned over to the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department for use in mid-2021.



Human Relations Roundtable

Last year brought with it a renewed call for social justice and racial equality here in Santa Clarita and around the world. The City worked closely with local activists and the William S. Hart Union High School District to bring together the revamped **Human Relations Roundtable**. A diverse collection of community members have been selected to be part of this important group, which will work collaboratively to encourage and assist our community in eliminating all forms of racism and discrimination and promoting inclusion, understanding and appreciation of human differences.

The brand-new **Canyon Country Community Center**, located at the corner of Soledad Canyon Road and Sierra Highway, is right on track! As roadwork continues on streets surrounding the project site, crews are hard at work finishing the community center building and other on-site amenities. When the Canyon Country Community Center opens to the public later this year, residents will enjoy the gymnasium, demonstration kitchen, activity and classroom space, outdoor basketball court and much more! Message from the Assistant Fire Chief ANDERSON MACKEY

Los Angeles County is lucky to have nice, sunny weather on most days, but when cooler temperatures do roll in we often see an increased interest in space heaters. Space heaters have become a popular and

inexpensive way to keep warm. The Los Angeles County Fire Department would like to remind you to properly use space heaters. Each year, hundreds of fires are started as a result of improperly used space heaters.

Here are several dos and don'ts for space heater safety; we want to make sure to keep you, your family and the Santa Clarita community safe during cold winter nights.

DOs:

- Place the heater on a level, hard, non-flammable surface, such as a ceramic tile floor.
- Make sure any heater is at least three feet away from any flammable materials, such as bedding, drapes and furniture.
- Keep children and pets away from space heaters.
- Always turn off the heater when you leave the room.

DON'Ts:

- Never leave a space heater on when you go to sleep.
- Do not place a space heater anywhere near a sleeping person; they may toss and turn in the middle of the night and burn themselves.
- Do not use portable propane space heaters indoors or in any confined space unless they are specifically designed for such use.
- Never use your oven as a space heater.

Following these simple tips can mean the difference between life and death. Please remember that it only takes a moment for an unattended heater to cause a fire. For additional fire safety tips and to prepare your Ready Set Go Wildfire Action Plan, please visit fire.lacounty.gov/rsg.

Santa Clarita Public Library Update

The onset of the COVID-19 pandemic did not stop the **Santa Clarita Public Library** from being innovative and thoughtful in how they deliver programs and services to the public. From the Spring and Summer Reading Programs to virtual storytime, Grab and Go Craft and Activity Kits, curbside pickups, library lockers and more, library staff continued to find new ways to serve and engage our community. The increased video content due to the pandemic led the Santa Clarita Public Library to reaching over 137,000 individuals online from March through November.

Additionally, the Library proved to be an essential resource for students navigating their way through distance-learning. When visiting **SantaClaritaLibrary.com**, students of all ages are able to access Live Homework Help, online practice exams, eBooks, audiobooks, mental health resources and countless other tools to support successful learning. Parents who are homeschooling can also find support through the Library's Parent Teacher Resource Center Collection, which offers curriculum guidance, a Common Core Standards handbook and more.

Looking further into 2021, the Santa Clarita Public Library team continues to prepare exciting and enriching initiatives and programs for all ages. Residents can look forward to the **2021 One Story One City** programming, another exciting Summer Reading Program and much more throughout the year.

Addressing Homelessness

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the homeless population has been identified as high-risk.

The City stepped up to ensure that our local community members experiencing homelessness had the necessary space for social distancing by allowing Bridge to Home, Santa Clarita's primary homeless services provider, to temporarily relocate to



the City's Newhall Community Center. Meanwhile, this year will also bring two enhanced shelter locations to Santa Clarita. Work will begin on Bridge to Home's permanent location on Drayton Street in Newhall, on land donated by the City. Another local homeless services provider, Family Promise of SCV, will begin construction on affordable housing and case management office on property also formally owned by the City. This property transfer, as well as the initial donation of land to Bridge to Home, puts the amount of land the City has contributed at nearly \$3 million. Meanwhile, the Community Task Force to Address Homelessness continues to make great strides in providing crucial resources and services to our neighbors experiencing homelessness. The Task Force is comprised of 30 key stakeholders. Due to the pandemic, one of the main data sources for homeless outreach will not be possible this year. The 2021 Homeless Count has been canceled and the 2020 data results will hold for this year and continue to drive and support local homeless initiatives. 
COVID-19 Resources for Residents and Businesses



Heads Up DUI Campaign

Heads Up! Know Your Limits, Know Your Options Although the traffic collision rate in the City of Santa Clarita dropped by 30 percent in 2020 and is down 52 percent since 2016, collisions involving those driving under the influence continue to be an issue. To eliminate instances of DUI in Santa Clarita completely, the City's Traffic Safety team, in partnership with the Santa Clarita Valley Sheriff's Station, reminds residents that it is never a good idea to get behind the wheel when under the influence.
